INTRANSITIVE VERB:

An intransitive verb denotes an action, which stops with the doer (subject) and does not pass on to any other noun or pronoun (object). Or a verb, which does not require an object to complete its sense, but makes good sense by itself, is called an Intransitive Verb.

Example:

- 1. The king <u>laughed</u> loudly.
- 2. The school <u>starts</u> at 7 a.m.
- 3. We <u>stopped</u> there a little.
- 4. The train <u>stopped</u> suddenly.
- 5. The show <u>opens</u> at six o" clock.
